The benefits of in-depth local stories told through the pens and keyboards of impartial journalists cannot be overstated. They have a professional responsibility to investigate the truth and present their findings in a balanced way. Our Founding Fathers recognized how valuable the press is to a healthy democracy by enshrining this right in the United States Constitution. Unfortunately, the “press” is shrinking or disappearing altogether making it incumbent upon all citizens to seek out reliable, trustworthy and unbiased news and information from other sources.

Access to such information is especially important at the local level. The irony of local government is that it is the government that **most directly** affects our lives through its municipal services, but it is also the government about which we know the **LEAST**.

The bi-annual Borough Bulletin, which is a handbook of more current events, can also be found electronically on the Borough website.

Once you access the website for Whitehall Borough, you have the ability to ask a question (info@whitehallboro.org) or to have Borough News delivered monthly right to your inbox. These features are found at the bottom of the home page.

If you are interested in seeing how Whitehall Borough government makes public policy in “real time” or within a short period thereafter, you will soon be able to do so officially. Council Chambers are being moved to the Multi-Purpose Room, which is behind the current Council Chambers and down the left hallway. As part of the renovations to the Multi-Purpose Room, communication lines are being installed to enable live-streaming of the Council Meetings.

WHITEHALL BOROUGH WORKING FOR ITS RESIDENTS LOCALLY AND STATEWIDE !

Whitehall Borough is an active participant and partner in many government organizations such as *PSAB, SHACOG, and ALOM* that provide member municipalities like Whitehall Borough access to **grant opportunities, ongoing education, legislative participation, shared cost savings and a banner service community** designation providing highest standards of service to its constituents.

PSAB:

The Pennsylvania State Association of Boroughs (PSAB) is a non-partisan, non-profit organization founded in 1911 dedicated to serving 956 Borough Governments. Whitehall Borough has taken advantage of the Resolution process as we currently have for consideration in the State Legislature a Resolution that PennDOT be responsible for infrastructure repair of their State roads running through Pennsylvania Boroughs. Whitehall Borough is pursuing this legislation to protect its Borough Residents from being responsible to pay for State road repairs.

Whitehall Borough has also presented a Resolution to create a *statewide advertising* website that would lessen the expense to Residents for mandated advertising. With limited newspaper circulation in which to advertise, the State website would be much less costly than limited newspapers and convenient for both Boroughs and Vendors.

SHACOG:

The South Hills Area Council Of Governments (SHACOG). The tangible benefits achieved through SHACOG are in either the form of actual savings (that which is realized through the SHACOG Purchasing Alliance), avoided administrative costs (as is done with the complex multi-municipal bid for Solid Waste Collection, Removal and Disposal), or the ability to do collectively what no one municipality can effectively accomplish individually (such as the development, training and staffing of the SHACOG Critical Incident Response Team). Whitehall Borough continues to be a proud participant of SHACOG.

ALOM:

The Allegheny League of Municipalities (ALOM) honors municipalities and authorities that distinguish themselves as model communities through their commitment to sustainable practices including professional development, intergovernmental cooperation, sound fiscal management and proactive communications through the **Banner Community Program**. Whitehall Borough was one of the inaugural municipalities to receive the Banner Community Award.



GRANTS SECURED BY OUR BOROUGH MANAGER!

Whitehall Borough Manager Courtney M. Wertz has secured just over a **half million dollars** for the Community in grant funding providing monies for parks, equipment, memorials, and Fire Company equipment.

As Whitehall Borough looks to the next 75 years, the Elected Officials and Borough Staff continue to work hard every day ensuring **Whitehall Borough remains the best place to live.**

MANAGER'S MESSAGE

COURTNEY M. WERTZ

2024 is shaping up to be another big year for Whitehall Borough!

A busy start to the year has already seen the installation of 10 new **"Welcome to Whitehall"** signs that complement the new street signs installed last year. Two new trucks for the Public Works Department have arrived and are road ready. Additionally, fresh paint and new carpet in the Planning, Zoning & Code Enforcement have been installed as part of an ongoing, multi-year "Administration Refurbishment" project.

Staff is in the final stage of launching **credit card terminals and online payment options** for various Borough permits, fines and events. Our goal is to make things more convenient for Residents as we (finally) implement 21st century payment options.

Speaking of 21st century improvements – Chief Gagorik and I have been working with Comcast for almost 2 years to install a dedicated Fiber internet line to the Borough Building. (All construction at their expense too). Last month we officially made the switch and now that we have a secure and reliable connection, Staff is looking ahead to investigating streaming capabilities of Borough Council meetings. We hope to launch that later this year.

Other capital projects happening now include the rehabilitation of **Overlook Park**. Work is underway and we hope to open back up to the public later this summer. This will be the first Borough Park to have a poured in place rubber playground surface instead of mulch which is a very exciting amenity as we've heard from parents and grandparents alike.

The Borough continues to investigate installing **Solar Panels** on a Borough owned site. Whitehall is looking to not only reduce our carbon footprint but also hedge against rising electricity costs. Municipalities are not immune to the rising utility rates that Residents see in their own homes.

Public Works is making plans to install a new Bronze Plaque at the **Honor Roll** on Baptist Road thanks to the assistance of Representative Nick Pisciotano. The new plaque honors Residents that have served in the armed forces.

When this magazine arrives in your mailbox, the **2024 Road Program** bid should have been opened and underway. The following roads are tentatively scheduled to be paved in part or full– **Nurnberger Drive, Ranger Drive, Mooreridge Drive, Portview Circle, Raintree Drive, Frank Street**. *(Please note that due to the fluctuating cost of asphalt, this list could change depending on bid prices).*

Please make sure to follow *official* Borough communication channels for factual and accurate information. If you have a question that is not answered by the information posted on these channels, please do not hesitate to contact Staff via telephone or email. We also welcome Residents to drop in during regular business hours as well.

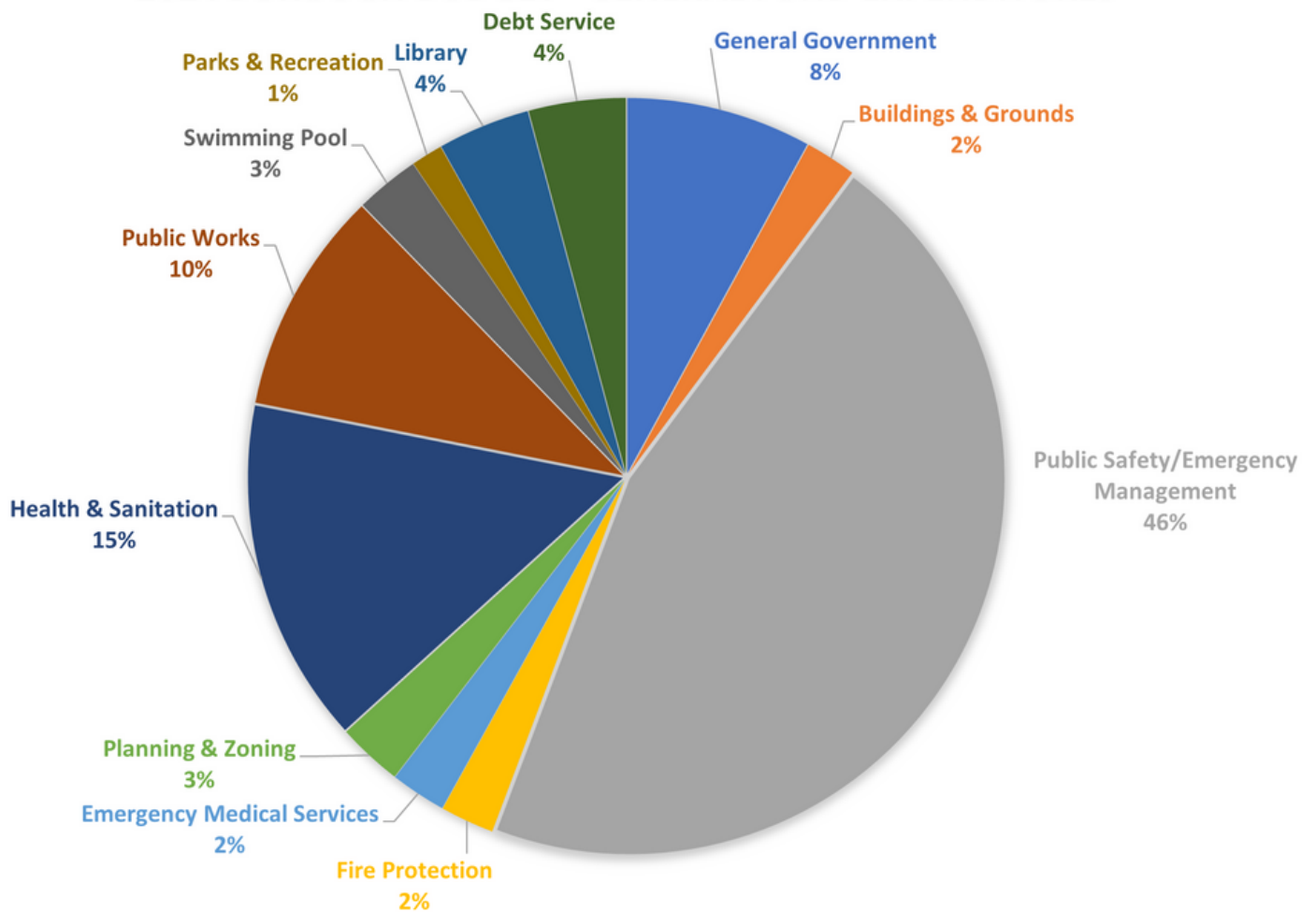

1st place Pumpkin = Peacock, decorated by Borough Manager, Courtney Wertz!

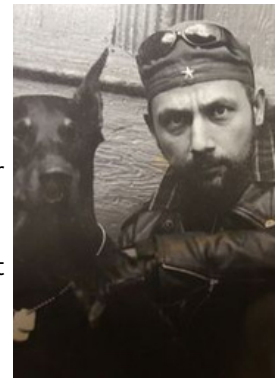
1st place Gingerbread House = Cabin in the Woods, decorated by Public Works Foreman, Dave Porter!

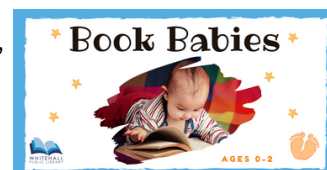

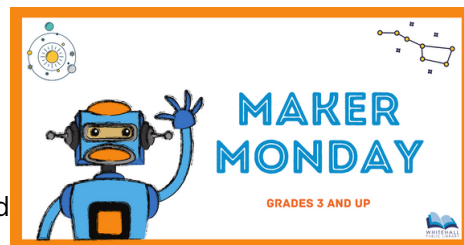

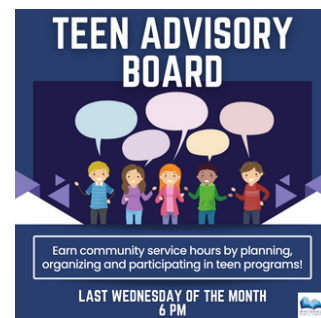

CODE ENFORCEMENT CORNER

POOL PROTOCOL

Summer Swimming will be here in a blink of an eye!
So let's not halt the fun!

Fun fact! Pools permit applications are among the most popular submittals to the Code Office.

Criteria to keep in mind..

- A permit is required for a pool of twenty four (24") inches of water or more.
- Portable / seasonal pools are not exempt from a permit.
- A swimming pool must be located in the back yard on the property.
- Pools located on corner lots shall be completely screened from the street by evergreen plantings.
- A swimming pool must be protected by either a locking ladder or fence.
- Six (6') foot high privacy type fences are allowed as an accessory to the pool but must be located within twelve (12') feet of the pool walls & removed with the pool.
- Fences are a separate permit, not included as part of the pool permit.
- When closing the pool for the season, water must be drained into a **sanitary sewer**, not into a stormwater drain.

SUBMITTING YOUR INFORMATION –

1. BIU Building Application
2. Zoning Permit Application
3. Storm Water Application
4. Copy of your Homeowners Declaration Page
5. Contractors Insurance
6. Survey of property

All of this information is pertinent to ensure your safety & for proper review and approval of your swimming pool permit.

BUILDING PERMIT BRIEF

Time is of the essence to you so let's talk permit process!

Assuming all information on the Application(s) required for your specific project are completed and all other necessary documentation such as your survey, plans, contractor insurance, etc., are present, please allow at least a **one month** grace period between the time you submit your application to the Borough and the time you want to begin your project.

This time allowance is necessary due to many factors, some including:

- Most building permit applications have to go through 2 separate Departments (Zoning & Building Inspection).
- Each Department has up to 15 days for the review process, if needed.
- Additional details / information may need to be provided by you.
- Spring & Summer months are prime time for application submittals.

A Survey is required to accompany every application. If you do not have one, you may need to hire a Surveyor. The Borough is not responsible for supplying a Survey.

Remember, once your permit is approved, it is valid up to a year for you to begin your project, so you may consider planning in advance. And be sure to make yourself copies (for your records) of all the paperwork you submit to the Borough, as those documents are kept on file at the Borough and not returned to you with the approved Building Permit.





For over 75 years, the Whitehall Borough Police Department has been recognized as one of the more innovative law enforcement agencies in Western Pennsylvania. We were one of the first Municipal Police agencies to establish a fatal accident reconstruction team, incorporate the use of in-car video technology into patrol activities, as well as being instrumental in the development of many regional programs such as a shared law enforcement records management system, multi-jurisdiction special response teams, and cooperative police training initiatives.

Despite these and many other notable accomplishments, the one that always seemed to elude us was achieving State Law Enforcement Accreditation status. That's why it brings us great pride to *formally* announce that the Whitehall Borough Police Department was accepted to participate in the [Pennsylvania Law Enforcement Accreditation Program \(PLEAC\)](#) at the beginning of this year.

PLEAC, introduced by the Pennsylvania Chiefs of Police Association in 2001, is a program designed to enhance the professionalism of law enforcement agencies within the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania. This is accomplished by ensuring our internal policies and procedures meet the 125 professional standards established by the commission. The accreditation process is broken down into three phases:

PHASE 1 begins with the law enforcement agency and governing body submitting a letter of intent to the accreditation commission.

PHASE 2 begins with the department accreditation manager and other members performing an internal review of Department operations, policies, and procedures; followed by a "mock assessment" to see how we compare with the program standards.

PHASE 3 involves trained assessors performing an onsite review of Department operations, policies, and procedures and interviewing members to ensure compliance with all accreditation standards.

Some may ask why a successful agency like the Whitehall Borough Police Department should work to achieve state accreditation status? We can say with confidence that we are not taking on this project to correct deficiencies or inadequacies. Our reason for becoming an accredited law enforcement agency is simple - we want to formally recognize our officers and civilian support staff's ability to continually meet or exceed expectations of professionalism each and every day. Accreditation also provides an opportunity to highlight our members' commitment to professional standards, formalized processes, and mission of the Whitehall Borough Police Department.

In 2023, the Whitehall Fire Company experienced a busy year, addressing a total of 536 calls, which included 25 structure fires—setting new records in our 77-year history. The Company's dedicated firefighters devoted a minimum of 1,800 man-hours to training, encompassing our routine weekly sessions for fire suppression, equipment utilization, and rescue operations. Additionally, members completed specialized training in Rope Rescue, Incident Safety Officer, and Pump Operations 2.

Furthermore, all our Fire Line Officers, along with some of our firefighters, have now achieved NFPA Fire Fighter 2 certification. Notably, our first two Junior Firefighters have accomplished Allegheny County's Essentials of Firefighting Course. Our Fire Line Officers received recognition for life-saving awards, and one member attained life membership status, commemorating over 20 years of unwavering service.

A significant milestone this year was establishing a **Duty Shift Crew** with the valuable support of the Borough. This crew ensures a prompt response, particularly during weekdays when most members are at work.

The Company aspires to sustain and grow this program with ongoing support from the Borough. On the community outreach front, we educated over 1,000 children on fire prevention in elementary schools and made visits to student-athletes during their cheer and football practices.

The Company would also like to introduce you to three of our firefighters- (L-R) Lee Price, Paul "PJ" Bruschi and Caelan Austin.



Lee Price has been a dedicated member of the Whitehall Fire Company since 1984. According to our records, Lee has actively responded to over 8,000 calls, earning him the prestigious title of the all-time leader in this category. His contributions extend beyond mere response numbers; Lee has served as Fire Chief on two separate occasions. Notably, he is not only the father of one of our firefighters, Tyler, but also the present Fire Chief, Nicholas Price.

Adding to his impressive legacy, Lee recently retired after more than three decades of devoted service with the Whitehall Borough Public Works Department. We deeply appreciate Lee's lifelong commitment to our community and recognize the invaluable mentorship he has provided to many of our firefighters.

In 2019, **Paul "PJ" Bruschi** became a valued member of the Whitehall Fire Company. Since his arrival, PJ has dedicated himself to training, consistently responding to alarms, and willingly taking on any tasks assigned by the Company. His involvement extends beyond the call of duty, including contributions to updating our radio communications systems and procedures for use on the fire-ground, as well as enhancements to our internal and external online communications methods and systems.

PJ was rightfully recognized last year for his courageous efforts in assisting with the rescue of an individual from a burning structure. PJ's commitment and proactive involvement exemplify the spirit of the Whitehall Fire Company.

At the age of 16, **Caelan Austin** joined as a Junior Firefighter. As a Junior Firefighter, Caelan demonstrated a strong eagerness to learn all aspects of the fire service, actively participating in drills and readily taking on any tasks assigned to him. In 2023, Caelan achieved a significant milestone by completing Allegheny County's Essentials of Firefighting Course.

Building on this accomplishment, Caelan wasted no time and promptly commenced his NFPA Fire Fighter 1 training, ultimately obtaining certification by the end of the year. The Whitehall Fire Company takes great pride in Caelan's achievements and looks forward to witnessing his continued growth.

REFUSE & RECYCLING REMINDERS!

All trash must be placed in the Trash Toter to be collected. No items placed outside of the Toter will be collected.

BULK-ITEM COLLECTION

Residents may place up to two (2) bulk items at the curb once a month. The collection of bulk waste shall be on the same day of your regular collection. The Borough's designated bulk waste collection week is the **3RD WEEK OF THE MONTH**.

YARD WASTE

What is considered Yard Waste?



- Leaves
- Grass Clippings
- Garden Residue (branches, brush, flowers, roots, wood waste)
- Tree Trimmings
- Plant Material



- Loose Soils
- Sod
- Food Waste from gardens or orchards
- Food Compost
- Lumber/Wood
- Tree Limbs over 4 inches in diameter
- Animal Excrement
- Noxious Weeds
- Contaminated Soils

- Hours of Collection: 6:00 AM-5:00 PM
- Garbage or recycling containers may not be placed at the curb prior to 3:00 PM the afternoon before collection day and must be removed before 8 PM on the day of collection. Refuse & recyclables must be placed within 5 feet of the curb.
- Carpet & pads: Five-foot width maximum, rolled and tied, bundles not to exceed 50 pounds.
- Paint - Mix leftover paint in a heavy plastic bag with kitty-litter until all the liquid is absorbed. Empty paint cans (with lids off) and the plastic bags containing the paint/litter mixture can then be placed at the curb.



GLASS recycling is back in 2024!

As a reminder, the Borough has implemented Single Stream Recycling. Recyclable Items include the following:

- GLASS
- Aluminum and Tin Cans
- Plastics 1 & 2 ONLY
- Paper and Cardboard - Magazine, Catalogs, Telephone Books, Junk Mail, Envelopes, All Color Office Paper, Paper Grocery Bags, Newspapers and Cardboard Boxes (Cardboard Boxes must be flattened and placed INSIDE the blue toter for removal).

The Borough provides a dumpster in the upper lot entrance to Prospect Park from **April 1 to October 31** for Residents to discard their yard waste for composting. Yard Waste should be dumped directly into the dumpster without plastic bags.
