MAYOR'S REPORT

WHITEHALL'S PATRIOTISM ON DISPLAY



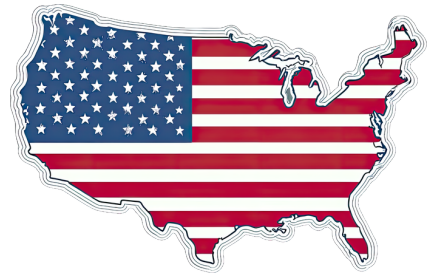
The biggest public event in Whitehall Borough history occurred almost 50 years ago on June 6, 1976. It was a celebration of the bicentennial of our country. The main event consisted of a parade which preceded the burial of a time capsule on the grounds of the Whitehall Borough municipal complex. The parade included 14 fire companies and 22 marching bands, as well as many Whitehall organizations.

Now 50 years later, we are about to commemorate the 250th anniversary of the Declaration of Independence and the birth of our country. Are you ready? Will you participate? To stimulate your interest, here are highlights of some of the planned events occurring in Whitehall Borough in 2026 to commemorate what has become known as America250.

The first event, sponsored by the Whitehall Borough Historical Society, will occur on April 9, 2026, at 7:00 P.M. at the Dr. Regis V. Shalley Performing Arts Center at Baldwin High School. Five local celebrities, one of whom grew up in Whitehall, will reflect upon the theme of **"Life Liberty and the Pursuit of Happiness in the 21st Century."** Baldwin High School students will support this event with their singing and a dramatization.

During the grand **"Fourth of July Celebration Weekend"** in Whitehall Borough, the festivities will begin on Friday June 26, 2026, with the annual spectacular **fireworks** at the Caste Village Shopping Center paid for by the Caste Village Merchants' Association. The following day, a number of events organized by the Whitehall America250 Committee will include the **unveiling of the contents of the time capsule buried in 1976** by the Whitehall Bicentennial Committee. Among possible supporting events being considered by the Whitehall America250 Committee is a parade in the neighborhood surrounding the municipal complex in which all Whitehall organizations will be asked to participate and express their patriotic spirit.

Whitehall Community Weekend will close out the Borough's Whitehall America250 events. On Saturday August 8, 2026, the contents of the 1976 time capsule as well as the contents of the 2026 time capsule that will be buried for the next 50 years will be on display at the booth of the Whitehall Borough Historical Society. On Sunday August 9, 2026 the new time capsule will be buried at a time and location to be determined.



I am proud to call the United States of America and Whitehall Borough my home. It is my sincere hope that you will be able to put aside the many demands of everyday life and pause to focus on and celebrate with us the 250th anniversary of the greatest country on earth.

SHAPING WHAT COMES NEXT

For this Spring and Summer edition of the Whitehall Borough Magazine, it is important to reflect on what Spring and Summer represent. As color comes back into the outdoors, we will soon be seeing fresh green grass in our yards and leaves on our trees again. Flowers will be blooming and all the snowfall we had this Winter will be a distant memory. We'll be enjoying time outside again. Much of that time at Whitehall's Parks and Swimming Pool. Spring is a time of renewal and rebirth.

Much like how the seasons change and regrow, Whitehall is going through changes and regrowth on Council. Our Council has had a large turnover this past election. Linda Book, Bill Veith, and Stone Sobieralski all left council. New to council, are **Eric Crane, Christy Kuehn, and Richard Kirsch**. After newly elected **Patrick Connors** announced he was unable to complete his term, we as Council, voted in February to appoint **Kathy DePuy** for the remainder of the year. With those changes, we now are a Council having a combined six years of experience. That is quite a change from the years of experience of the past Council. This change is significant and not one to be taken lightly.

But what the remaining members and new members lack in Council experience, make up for with wonderful and unique professional experiences. This Council is bringing in people who know how to work together and solve big and difficult problems. People who know how to respectfully convey their thoughts and also respectfully disagree. I am confident and excited for what the future holds with this group of determined people.

With all of that said, I think it is important to level set with our Residents about what this next year will look like. This year will be a **year of planning** for Whitehall. We are in a strong and positive position right now, but we need to look to maintain and grow that for our Residents. To do that, we need to make plans of where to focus our efforts. One area of focus will be with our **Borough Parks**. Over the next few months, you, our Residents, will be able to engage with and share your perspectives and preferences on the direction our Parks will take. Which parks should be updated and how should they be. Those changes won't be immediate but will set priorities for which Parks to focus on.

We have planning to do on a less flashy front with our **Borough Building**. The Borough Building not only houses our Administrative Staff, Planning and Zoning Staff and Council Chambers, but also our Police Department, Community Room and Library.

This year we need to perform necessary and emergent repairs to a significant portion of the building affected by water damage. This is set to be an expensive repair that will temporarily affect usage of the Community Room. The building has other problems that need to be addressed soon as well, such as the HVAC system and roof. How best to address and pay for those fixes is something Council needs to plan for.

There is also a **Joint Fire Study** currently being conducted to look at not only the Whitehall Fire Company, but also our neighbors including the Brentwood Volunteer Fire Company and Baldwin Fire Rescue. The goal of this study is to see what can be done to strengthen the partnerships of each fire company and also to see where there should be improvements, be it on the municipal funding side or on the fire company side. The results of this study will help to create a plan for the Whitehall Fire Company to be set up for continued success in the years to come.

All of this is to say there is a lot of learning and planning that will be taking place this year. This Council has the tools and people to be able to work together to critically evaluate each of these issues and come forward with the best decision to make our Borough stronger in the future. Transitions like we are experiencing now can feel uncomfortable for everyone. But on the other side of that discomfort is the success that we all want to see for Whitehall.

We are looking forward to your feedback and participation in every part of this and encourage you to come to Council Meetings held the first and third Wednesday of each month at 7:00 PM.

MANAGER'S MESSAGE

COURTNEY M. WERTZ

As we await the blossoms of Spring, the 2026 Workplan is in full bloom. The 2026 Road Program bid is currently out to bid. The following roads are tentatively scheduled to be paved in part or full – Villaview Drive, West Lawnview Ave, Woodycrest Drive & Baldwin Manor Road. *Please note that due to the fluctuating cost of asphalt, this list could change depending on bid prices.* New this year - the Borough is subsidizing the program from the General Fund as asphalt prices continue to rise. Staff is investigating emerging technologies on how to extend the life of our roads for presentation to Council at the 2027 Borough Budget meetings.

2026 is slated to be a year of planning focused on Borough infrastructure. Everything from roads, sewers, parks and the Borough Building itself will be evaluated as large capital investments will be needed in the coming years across the Community. Borough Elected Officials and Staff are cognizant that such expenditures, while necessary, are not inexpensive. We are committed to planning, prioritizing and phasing improvements in a way that does not have a negative financial impact on current residents and sets future generations up for success.

For Capital Expenditures this year - monies have been allocated for an update to the **Parks Master Plan** from 2019. For more details on that process, check out page 12-13. New benches and picnic tables for the entire Parks system have been ordered and bid specifications are being prepared for the installation of a pavillion/shade structure at Overlook Park. These capital improvements are thanks to grant monies secured with the support of Senator Pisciotano and Representative Inglis.

The most essential project planned for 2026 is also slated to be the most disruptive. In late 2025, Borough Staff alerted the Borough Engineer to a damp wall in the **Planning, Zoning & Code Enforcement Office**. After investigation, it was determined that the foundation of the original Borough Building is crumbling in that location. A solution is being designed and will involve extensive digging as repairs will be made from the exterior – impacting access to the Library Entrance and Community Room Entrance at different points.

Lastly, work on the **Joint Fire Study** with Baldwin Borough, Brentwood Borough and their respective Fire Departments continues. ROBB Consulting spent the holiday season interviewing numerous and various stakeholders about current operations in the Tri-Borough area. The Borough will continue to actively participate in this process. This study will provide written guidance on how we can collaborate to best provide adequate and cost-effective fire services to all Residents as the landscape surrounding volunteer fire companies continues to change.

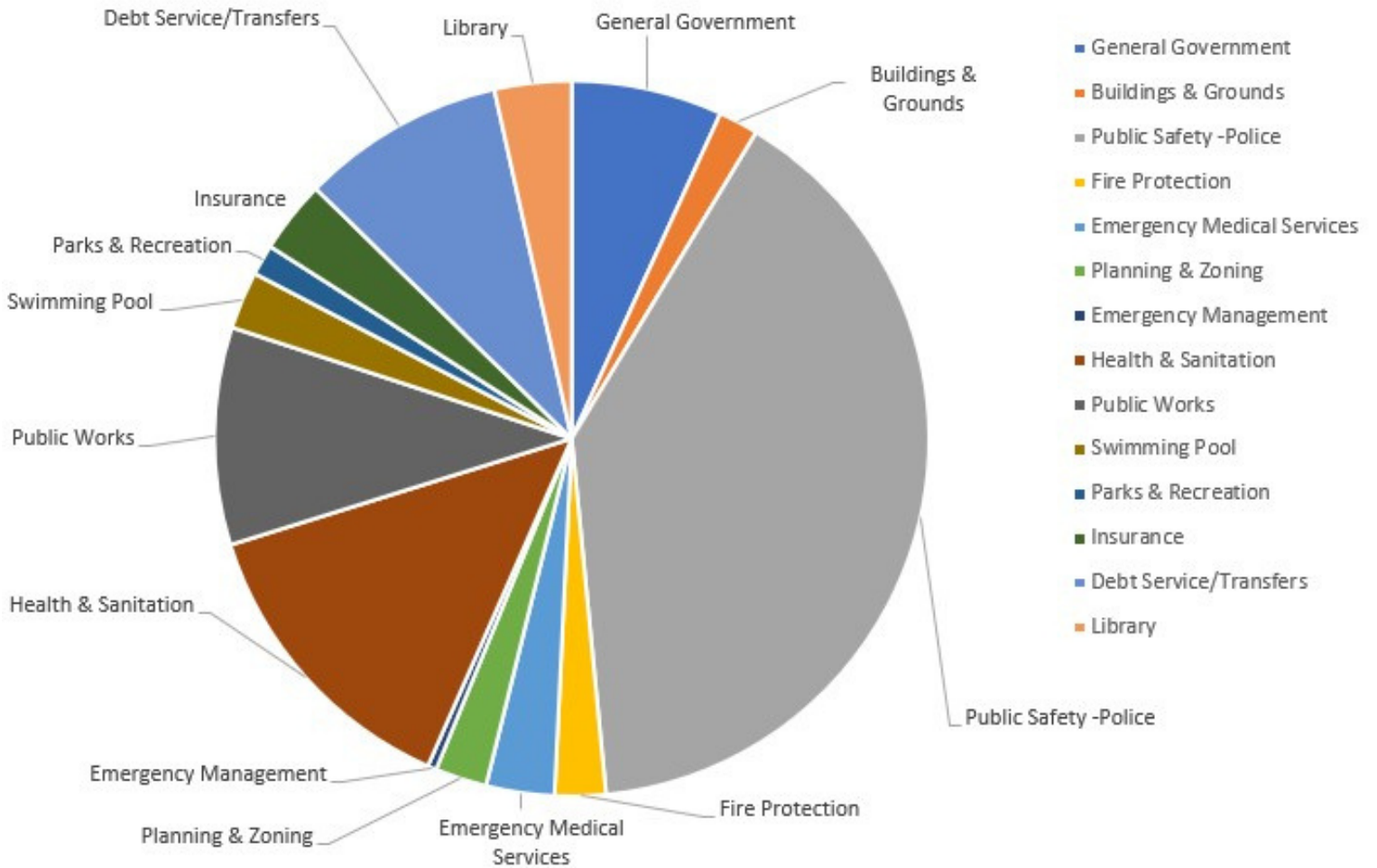

- Specialized equipment for patrol services
- Officer wellness and training initiatives
- Emergency Management and critical incident response

Retiring Council Members Proclamation

At the December 17, 2025 Council Meeting, Mayor Nowalk presented a proclamation honoring retiring Council Members Linda Book, Kathy DePuy, and Bill Veith – officially recognizing December 17 as Linda, Kathy and Bill Day. We extend our sincere gratitude for their many years of dedicated service and their commitment to making Whitehall Borough a better place to live.

Free Little Food Library

In partnership with Whitehall Borough and the Library, Staff created a Free Little Food Library, open to everyone. Take what you need and give what you can. The pantry is stocked with non-perishable food items and flyers highlighting local community resources. You can help feed our neighbors by donating shelf-stable foods such as canned goods, dried fruit and lentils, instant meals and sides and baby food. Donations and pickups are welcome in the Library Lobby at 100 Borough Park Drive, Pittsburgh, PA 15236 during regular Library hours.

Grant Awards

The Borough was successful in securing two 2025 DCNR grants:

1. Whitehall Borough was awarded **\$71,200** for reimbursement related to the acquisition of 3091 Provost Road (the former Swim Club property). With this reimbursement, the Borough's out-of-pocket cost for the property is reduced to \$66,240.

2. Whitehall Borough was awarded **\$310,400** for the Tennis Court Refurbishment Project. These funds are in addition to the **\$100,000** previously awarded through GEDTF, which will be used for new lighting at the courts.

Phase II of the Tennis Court Project will be evaluated as part of the Borough's 2027 Capital Projects Budget. In addition, a \$250,000 grant application submitted to the PA DCED Greenways, Trails & Recreation Program remains under review.

Intern Program

We're excited to share that the Borough has been selected as a placement site through the Local Government Academy to host an Intern this Summer! Assistant Manager, Alyssa Rogalla and Parks & Recreation Director, Hannah Bower recently attended the LGA Intern Fair to meet with prospective candidates and represent our Community. We're looking forward to welcoming the Borough's first intern this Summer!

Where We Started

In 2026, Whitehall Borough will undertake an update to the 2019 Neighborhood Parks Master Plan. The 2019 plan was financed in part by a \$30,000.00 grant from the Pennsylvania Department of Conservation and Natural Resources.



The 142-page document provides a wealth of information on the Borough's Park System gathered over almost 2 years of surveys, stakeholder interviews and public meetings from 2018-2019.

- Bid Awarded to A. Folino Construction in the amount of \$77,775.00.



Frank Park Phase II (2019)

- Installation of new Playground and Walking Path.
- Bid Awarded to Plavchak Construction in the amount of \$136,450.00.
- Public Works Installed \$23,755.00 Playground Set.



Prospect Park Phase I (2021-2022)

- Construction of Pavillion on Existing Concrete Path, Installation of 2 ADA Parking Space and ADA pathway.
- Bid Awarded to TBI Contracting Inc. in the amount of \$182,870.00.
- Financed in part by a \$85,000.00 DCNR Grant.
- Security Cameras Installed by Barrier Protection Systems for \$10,493.85.



Prospect Park Phase II (2021)

- Removal of the Small Baseball Field and Dugout. Installation of Grassy Field for informal Soccer use by surrounding Residents.
- In-House Project Completed by Public Works.



Union Park Phase I (2022)

- Demolition of Basketball Court to install an Inclusive Playground Set. Installation of 1 ADA Parking Space and ADA pathway.
- Public Works Installed \$62,242.00 Playground Set.
- Bid Awarded to Michael Facchiano Contracting in the amount of \$194,155.00.
- Financed in part by a \$118,000.00 DCNR Grant.



Overlook Park Refurbishment (2024)

- Installation of Playground Set with Poured-in-Place Rubber Surface, Construction of Shelter/Restroom Building, ADA Pathways. Replacement of steps to/from Orchard Hill Drive.

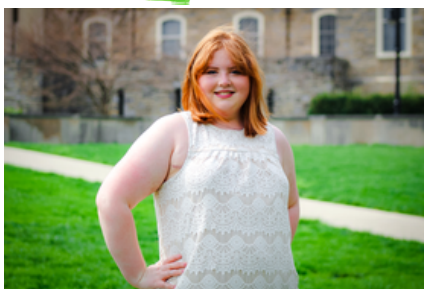

E-BIKES AND E-SCOOTERS



Dear Residents,

As we prepare for warmer weather, now is a good time to discuss the use of electric bicycles and scooters in our neighborhoods. Commonly known as “e-bikes and e-scooters” – these mobility devices continue to grow in popularity with people of all ages for commuting and recreation.

While the Police Department recognizes that these devices offer convenience and fun, we also recognize it’s our job to ensure that everyone who rides, walks or drives in our neighborhoods can do so safely. These devices can reach speeds that greatly reduce reaction time, making collisions with vehicle or pedestrians very dangerous.



Understanding Pennsylvania’s E-Bike Laws

Pennsylvania law classifies e-bikes as “pedal cycles with electric assist” and set clear expectations for how they must be operated:

- Riders must be at least **16 years old** to operate an e-bike on public roads.
- The motor may not assist the rider above **20 mph**.
- The electric motor must be **750 watts or less**.
- E-bikes are generally allowed on roads, bike lanes, and shared-use paths unless otherwise posted. They are **not permitted on sidewalks**.
- Riders must follow the same rules as traditional cyclists –obey traffic signals, stop at stop signs, yield to pedestrians and ride with the flow of traffic.

Safety Tips for Riders

Even when operated legally, e-bikes and e-scooters require caution and good judgment. The following tips help protect riders and everyone around them:

- Always supervise younger children.
- Wear a helmet and eye protection every time you ride.
- Be visible - use lights and reflective gear.
- Ride predictably - use hand signals and avoid weaving between cars.
- Stay alert - leave the headphones or air pods at home.
- Respect pedestrians - slow down on shared paths and announce when passing.

Under current Pennsylvania Law, e-scooters are not recognized as legal vehicles for operation on public roads, sidewalks, or bike paths. This means that, unlike bicycles or e-bikes with pedals, **e-scooters cannot be legally operated on public roadways or walkways**.

Whitehall Police Remain Committed to Your Safety

Officers will continue to educate riders, enforce state and local laws, and work with families to ensure e-bikes and e-scooters are used responsibly. We’re not necessarily looking to discourage their use. We want to make sure that every ride is lawful and ends safely. COMMUNITY UPDATE

Thank    **U Residents for your continued support!**

Since the beginning of the year, our volunteers have responded to over **150 calls** for service. These incidents have included emergency medical assists, motor vehicle accidents, fire alarms and mutual aid responses throughout our surrounding communities. Every call represents a neighbor in need, and our members continue to answer that call—day and night.

Maintaining reliable apparatus is critical to that response capability. We are beginning the **refurbishment of 301-Truck**, an important piece of our fleet. The planned refurbishment, estimated at approximately \$500,000 will extend the service life of the apparatus and modernize key components. For comparison, purchasing a new replacement truck today would cost in the range of \$2,000,000. This refurbishment is part of our long-term capital improvement plan, which evaluates apparatus lifecycle costs, replacement schedules and reserve funding to ensure we make responsible financial decisions well before equipment reaches the end of service.

Training remains a top priority. Our members regularly participate in drills and coordinated exercises with neighboring departments to strengthen mutual aid operations. Emergencies do not stop at municipal boundaries, and strong regional partnerships ensure seamless response during larger or more complex incidents.

In the coming weeks, the **Annual Fund Drive** will begin. As a volunteer organization, The Fire Company relies heavily on community contributions to support operations, equipment maintenance and training. Details will be shared soon, and we encourage every household to consider participating in support of your Whitehall Fire Company.

Don't wait to schedule your Dye Test

- The completed Plumbers Report (aka dye test form) **MUST** be submitted to the Code Enforcement Office at least **two (2) weeks** prior to the closing date. (NO RUSHES OR EXCEPTIONS will be granted the same week of the closing).
- Any Certified Plumber can perform your dye test.
- Plumbers ARE NOT required to perform a sewer lateral test.

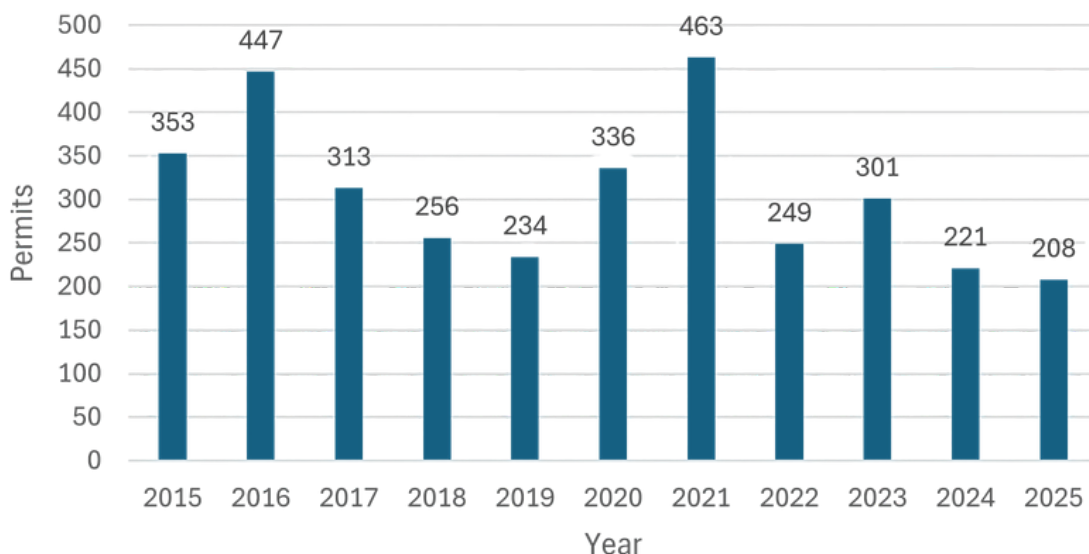

Building Permit Points

- **2 WEEKS** - Just as it took you time to plan out and perfect your project; please be patient with us while we review your paperwork. Time frame can be (but not always the case) two (2) weeks for a building permit application review.
- **BUSY SEASON** - Keep in mind that Spring and Summer are the busiest months for projects. Stay ahead of the game with early year submittals!
- **DOESN'T PAY OFF** - It is always important to remember that no work can begin until your application has been approved. This is for your benefit as unauthorized work can result in immediate removal and/or fees.
- **SURVEY** - If you do not have a Survey of your property; you will have to get one as a Survey is part of the required documentation for every building permit submitted. (Contact a Surveying or Engineering Company)
- **1 YEAR** - Once a building permit is issued, it is valid for a year. (If an extension is needed to complete the project, a written request is required by the homeowner or contractor)

WHITEHALL COMMITTEE FOR ENVIRONMENTAL ACTION

On February 7, 2026, thirty-seven representatives of environmentally focused non-profits, small businesses, community organizations and advocacy groups and over 60 visitors braved the cold temperatures to come together for a common purpose – to discuss what we can do individually and collectively to protect and sustain our environment for ourselves and future generations.

WE CAN ALL DO SOMETHING

- Keep reusable shopping bags in your vehicle and take them everywhere you shop – not just the grocery store.
- Find a new use or new home for everything you no longer need, use, or want.
- Think about the cleaning products you use. Can you make your own non-toxic cleaners, Can you visit a refill shop? Can you use microfiber clothes that do not require cleaning products? Can you buy in bulk to reduce packaging
- Try toilet paper or paper towels made from recycled paper or bamboo. It even comes wrapped in paper not plastic.
- Ask servers at restaurants not to bring you water if you will not drink it and not to bring a straw. If you are eating take-out at home, tell them you don't need plastic utensils.
- Plant native species in your yard and resist using chemicals like Round-up and other pesticides and fertilizers that end up in our water.
- Invest in a good reusable beverage container to reduce the number of plastic bottles.
- Strictly follow the Borough's recycling guidelines. Placing non-accepted items in recycling bins contaminates the entire load so that it must then go to the landfill.
- Ask leaders of organizations to which you belong how your group is recycling.
- Write to your legislators about the particular environmental issues you care about.
- Look for special recycling events for hard-to-recycle items.

Once your new habit becomes second nature, select another to work on. Together, we can all contribute to a cleaner community and a brighter future.

Healthy landscape care:

- ✓ Water as needed and early in the day to avoid overnight moisture
- ✓ Mulch the roots in a doughnut shape away from the trunk
- ✓ Nurture beneficial insects and birds by limiting use of chemicals
- ✓ Check early in Spring and often to catch problems when they are small
- ✓ Before killing an insect, check that it is not beneficial

Types of tree pests:

- sucking insects like aphids, scale, whitefly, spotted lanternfly, spider mites, leafhoppers
- chewing insects like bagworm, sawfly, Japanese beetle, webworm, cankerworm
- fungus and bacteria like anthracnose, Cedar apple rust, water mold, bacterial blight



Leafhoppers



Bagworm

For small infestations, use non-chemical solutions:

- pick the offenders off or cut away the infected part
- blast sucking and chewing insects with a strong water spray or a solution of 1 tbsp castille soap and 1 quart of water
- use organic Neem Oil, BTG nematodes (grubGONE), or insecticidal soap
- attract beneficials like ladybugs, lacewings, parasitic wasps, and birds to do their jobs
- only spray before or after beneficials are active

For large infestations, call a professional Arborist

Boring insects, like Bark and Ambrosia Beetles, are Nature's recycling crew.

They are usually found on stressed or dying trees.

- Call an Arborist to determine next steps.

The placement of garbage, rubbish and recycling containers at curbside may be no earlier than 3:00 PM on the day prior to the designated collection day and must be removed from curbside to the storage area no later than 8:00 PM on the day of collection.

Bulk Collection

Residents may place up to two (2) bulk items at the curb once a month. The collection of bulk waste will be on the same day as your regular collection. The Borough's designated bulk item collection week is the **3RD FULL WEEK OF THE MONTH**. (check the collection calendar to specify dates).

Bulk items are **NOT** collected by the regular trash truck. A separate truck designated specifically for bulk item collection operates at a different time of the day. Kindly ensure there is enough time for the truck to arrive before reporting the "missed" pick-up to the Borough.

Recyclable Items

- Aluminum and Tin Cans
- Plastics 1 and 2 ONLY
- Glass
- Paper and Cardboard – magazines, catalogs, telephone books, junk mail, envelopes, all color office paper, paper grocery bags, newspapers, and insert and cardboard boxes. Cardboard boxes must be flattened and cut in three-foot sections.

Yard Waste Dumpster

The Borough provides a dumpster from April 1 to October 31 at the **Public Works Garage at 100 Borough Park Drive** for Residents to discard their yard waste for composting.
